Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I am sure you have been looking forward to some warmer weather as much as I have. Spring seemed to begin and then revert to cold, wintery weather again. However, we are getting warmer again. Over the last month a few interesting things have taken place in the Diocese.



Relationship with the Diocese of Wangaratta

Bishop +Clarence Bester, of Wangaratta, and I have been working at co-operation between our two Diocese. As part of that, he invited me to Preach in Holy Trinity Cathedral Wangaratta for the Installation of the new Dean, the Very Rev'd Neil Hicks, on St Aidan's Day, 31 August. Our Dean, Fr Thomas, also attended this celebration.

Clergy Retreat

We began this co-operation last year by holding a combined Clergy Retreat with the Wangaratta Clergy, and on 16-19 September we held another Clergy Retreat with them at Pallotti College in the Yarra Valley. Our retreat conductor this year was the Very Rev'd Katherine Bowyer, Dean of Newcastle, who led us through some fascinating and helpful reflections with music and poetry. The theme of her addresses was "how can we sing the Lord's song in a strange land."

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Our Commitment to Safe Church Culture:

How We Treat Each Other

Our Diocese is moving forward in positive ways. I am pleased to announce an important new progression in 'Our Commitment to Safe Church Culture', approved by Diocesan Council, this month.

It includes the release of the new "How We Treat Each Other" documents.

As we all know, disagreements and human nature can be stressful at times for everyone in our parishes. Faithfulness in Service gives clear guidelines as to right values and behaviours for Clergy and Church Workers; and we now seek to extend this culture to all, and it must come from each of us.

The way any of us behaves towards others, makes a difference to how our parishes, church meetings, op shops (etc.), feel like good and safe places to be.

Safe Church Culture is a constant commitment. We need to be working together to ensure we're consistently achieving safety and community well-being. This new initiative gives us tools. Resources we can put into practice when we need to be doing things differently.

The new documents lay out an easy-to-read concise description of positive (prosocial) behaviours, and negative (antisocial) behaviours. These have been drawn up as a 'general rule of thumb' guideline for encouraging beneficial ways of behaving.

Two documents have been created for two different purposes:

- Poster/Noticeboard for public display of "How We Treat Each Other" for all church premises, (similar to the concept of Zero Tolerance notices in e.g. retail stores)
- A 'conversation starter' version for group or individual situations, guiding in-depth conversations

Setting public and clear guidelines for standards of behaviour shows the communities we serve how our faith in God is lived out following the example of Jesus. Treating one another by these standards makes real the love of God we proclaim. As the Apostle John said: *"let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action."* [1 John 3.18]

Licensed Lay Ministers Training

On Saturday 28 September we held a training day for all those who are LLMs in the Diocese. A good number of people registered and attended on the day, and we all enjoyed the gathering at the Cathedral. I know that not everyone who would have liked to attend were able to do so, therefore, the sessions on the day were video recorded and these recordings, along with the printout for the day will be made available across the Diocese for any, and all who may be interested. We sincerely thank Rev'd Gemma for her excellent skills in recording the sessions.

Companion Diocese Relationship with South Malaita

We have a long-established positive relationship with the Diocese of Hokkaido in Japan and look forward to that continuing. Alongside this we are going to establish a relationship with the new Diocese of South Malaita in the Solomon Islands. In part this is because we have quite a few faithful parishioners in Parishes across the Diocese who come from that part of the world. I will be visiting the Solomon Islands at the end of November for the celebration that will inaugurate this new Diocese in Sa'a Village on the Feast of Christ the King, Sunday 24 November. We hope and pray that this will bring blessing to both our Dioceses.



Please continue to pray for the Diocese as we seek to strengthen the financial foundation that allows us to continue ministering to far western NSW.

The Diocese's momentum is in keeping with society's trends. It's common for any organisation, nowadays, to have basic expectations that everyone can feel safe, respected and share a reasonable sense of welfare, in communal spaces and activities.

We Treat Each & Welcome! It's good to have you here.

As you **come into our space**, we ask you to help us make this a **safe place for everyone**. By entering here **you are agreeing** to abide by our Safe Church culture, based on the principles of Faithfulness in Service.

We **affirm behaviours** that bring out the best in others. **Prosocial behaviours** include:

- being kind and compassionate
- listening with the intent to understand
- resisting the urge to interrupt
- being aware of the tone of our voice
- allowing others to speak for themselves
- being considerate of the physical and
- emotional needs of others • co-operating and collaborating
- seeking creative outcomes

We avoid **antisocial behaviours** such as: threats, belittling, shouting, intimidation, insults, malicious gossip and spreading rumours. Antisocial behaviour causes divisiveness, reduces team effectiveness, and is upsetting and hurtful.

Our culture focuses on **prosocial behaviour** that encourages kindness, interest, care and compassion.



CWA Delegates Fill over The Cathedral with Vibrant Singing

The Cathedral was filled to overflowing on Sunday 8th September, as the parish welcomed members of the Association of Country Women Worldwide (locally known as the CWA), gathered in Griffith for their South Pacific Region Conference.

The Conference program included an Ecumenical Service of Thanksgiving, which the Cathedral was asked to arrange and host, and it was a delight that, as part of the service, choirs from three different churches in Griffith sang: each one of them representing a different Pacific Nation. We heard anthems from the Tongan Church Children's Choir, The Fijian Methodist Church Choir, and our own St Alban's Solomon Islander Choir. The congregation also had a chance to sing praises, with such classic hymns as 'Brother Sister, Let Me Serve You' and 'The Day You Gave Us Lord' included in worship.

Prayers were led by Mrs Jenny Rose, from Hillston Uniting Church, Major Lyn Cathcart, of the Griffith Salvation Army, and our own Rev'd Canon Sue-Ellen Chilvers, while the Rev'd Gemma Le Mesurier delivered a memorable sermon: skilfully weaving the story of the Death and Raising of Dorcas/Tabitha (Acts 9.36-42) with life lessons learned from the television classic 'The Golden Girls'. The Dean was informed at the conference dinner (on the Monday) that there are now a whole lot more members of the 'Rev'd Gemma Fanclub' !







Amongst the delegates was one with a very special connection to St Alban's Griffith. Mrs Christine King, Immediate Past State President of the Queensland CWA, was delighted to speak with the Dean after the service about one of his predecessors: her grandfather, Fr Walter Bennet, Rector of Griffith from 1925-37.

Christine told Fr Thomas that, after a very challenging time in Griffith (during which the Hall Church was erected in Noorebar Avenue and consecrated by the Bishop of London, while mission and youth meetings continued in the Banna Avenue Mission Hall), Fr Bennet went to Queensland to take up Rectorship of St Paul's Taringa, now part of the Parish of Christ Church

St Lucia, where he served for many years, overseeing the construction of two Parish Churches and other facilities. Christine remembers her grandfather as a man of deep faith and quiet practicality, which has inspired her own sense of community spirit.

The Thanksgiving Service was greatly appreciated by ACWW delegates, especially for the generous welcome offered by the Cathedral, the sense of togetherness amongst the ecumenical church representatives present, the beauty of the space, and the vibrancy of the music. St Alban's certainly ensured that the Riverina standard of hospitality and worship was maintained.



Registry Office

Works on the new Registry office are coming along quickly now – the cabinets are in and the flooring and tiling will be completed soon.

The exterior works are also steaming along with a retaining wall built around two sides of the building. The grading of the yard is beginning so as to be able to install the access ramp to the front door.

There will be a few weeks when the back of the hall will be fenced off while the concreting is being poured, and temporary access to the Op Shop will be via Noorebar Ave.

There were many, many underground services on this tiny piece of land, and our designers and builders have done an excellent job avoiding them all!

When you are next visiting the Cathedral, take a look at the construction, which is behind the Cathedral and between the Hall, Medical Centre and Child Care Centre.











We are still hopeful of moving into the office in October. After this, a blessing will be organised, and all those who are able, will be welcome to attend.

Blessing of the Stations of the Cross


From Savernake to Berrigan the road to Calvary is but one



Faith, Hope & Love Conference

The Families and Culture Commission of the Anglican Church of Australia held the National Conference on 2nd and 3rd September 2024 at St Jude's Anglican Church, Carlton, with this year's theme being *Faith, Hope, and Love: Churches Together Creating a Future Free from Family Violence.* Our Diocese was fortunate to be represented by **The Reverend Canon Sue-Ellen Chilvers**, Rector of the Parish of Coleambally-Darlington Point, and President of Diocesan Mother's Union. She writes:

This event was open to everyone from all churches and included delegates from the Domestic and Family Violence support and advocacy sector who to joined together in connecting and learning together, exploring ways to enhance our efforts in preventing and responding to domestic violence, both within our church communities and in the broader society.

The aim of the conference was to deepen our understanding of the root causes of domestic violence and the critical role the church can play in both prevention and response. The hope is to create a future fee from violence. The Families and Culture Commission of the Anglican Church of Australia partnered with Common Grace to hold this conference.

There were five keynote addresses:

1. Patty Kinnersley is the CEO of National DV Prevention organisation: **Our Watch.** She is a national leader in the primary prevention of violence against women and their children in Australia. Patty spoke about the work that Our Watch has done in identifying the faith sector as one of the key next frontiers in our national goal to prevent violence against women.

2. Dr Michael Flood is a Professor in the School of Justice at QUT. His research agenda includes interpersonal violence and its prevention, engaging men in violence prevention, men, masculinities, and gender justice. His keynote was titled "Hope in the midst of violence – What we know about perpetration and its implications for prevention."

3. Dr Leisa Aitken is a clinical psychologist whose recent PhD investigated theories of hope across the domains of psychology, philosophy and theology. Leisa will spoke on the difference that Hope makes. Her keynote presentation was titled: "What difference does Hope make? Psychology and theology in conversation." How can the gospel of hope help those impacted by domestic and family violence.

4. Gershon Nimbalker is the Director of **Common Grace**, a national Christian social justice organisation that seeks to inspire and equip Christians to make a difference in our nation. Gershon spoke about *Engaging with Hope and Grace: How churches can be community advocates in the prevention of violence against women.*

5. Alexander Dentener is the Prevention Coordinator for communities at **The Men's Project**, part of Jesuit Social Services. Alex's focus is on working with men around their ideas, relationships and motivations to create a healthier community and challenge inequality. Alex spoke about The Man-Box research project: a comprehensive study that focuses on the attitudes to manhood and the behaviours of Australian men aged 18 to 45. His *keynote presentation was titled: Hope and the Man Box: what we are learning about men, masculinities and prevention of violence against women.*

A number of 30-minute workshops were also available, which were very useful. A number of Dioceses highlighted the work they are doing including Melbourne, Perth and Newcastle. The networking session held on Monday opportunity to make connections with others from across Australia.

The key message I have taken from the conference is that we all have a role to play in ending family and gender-based violence. It is up to each and every one of us to call-out men and boys, and likewise women, in initial circumstances when we encounter any abuse because actions early on lead to a reduction in the escalation and incidence of future violence. We can examine the Ten Commitments for Prevention and Response to Domestic and Family Violence in the Anglican Church of Australia, which is a great tool to help resource and empower our parish churches to bring about change and to continuously improve our preventative work.


